I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m.

II. Roll Call:

Members Present: Commissioners Kena Abdissa, Liza Allen, Kevin Dostal Dauer, Tom Harkins, Mark Jansen and Adam Stout.

Members Absent: Commissioners Duncan Potter and Roberto Valdizan.

Also Present: Director Tony Paetznick and Council Member Jeanne Frischman.

III. Approval of Agenda

Motion by Allen, seconded by Harkins to approve the June 9, 2025 agenda as presented. Motion carried 6-0.

IV. Approval of Minutes

Motion by Dostal Dauer, seconded by Stout to approve the May 12, 2025 minutes as presented. Motion carried 6-0.

V. Presentations and Business Items

A. Park Ordinances Presentation

Director Paetznick provided the Commission with a presentation on the City's parking ordinances. He explained there seemed to be interest in addressing the time limit parking restrictions in the City. He reviewed the current parking restrictions, noting these requirements have been in place since 1966. He reported the parking after snowfall requirements would remain in place. He believed people were generally good about moving their vehicles during snow events. He commented on the number of citations that have been issued for parking and noted most of the complaints came from areas surrounding multi-family housing. Staff reviewed the motorization trends in Minnesota, and it was noted there were twice as many cars registered in the State now than in the 1980's. He provided the Commission with further information on the City's living streets plan.

Discussion included:

- The Commission asked if the parking ordinances were in line with the neighboring communities. Director Paetznick reviewed the trends in neighboring communities noting many communities have limited time parking.
- The Commission questioned how citations were issued. Director Paetznick commented on how his officers work proactively to educate the public but explained generally citations are complaint based.
- The Commission inquired if a 72-hour parking rule could be put in place noting this was the standard in Golden Valley. Director Paetznick indicated he would speak to officials at Golden Valley to better understand how this standard works.
- The Commission asked if the department was having trouble with parked cars in the community that people were living in. Director Paetznick stated the department was aware of this issue, but his officers do not have a lot of encounters with these individuals and if contact is made, his officers would try to connect these individuals to resources.
- The Commission discussed how important time limited parking was surrounding Irondale High School and the City's parks.
- Councilmember Frischman suggested the City consider its messaging with multi-family residential properties to improve relations and educate the residents on the City's parking requirements.
- The Commission supported the Council updating the outdated time limit parking requirements.
- The Commission asked how street widths and one-sided street parking requirements were determined. Director Paetznick indicated this was determined by engineering staff.
- Director Paetznick provided further information on how "No Parking" signs were considered and approved by the City.
- The Commission recommended the new parking requirements be kept simple.

VI. Reports and Updates

Councilmember Frischman provided the Commission with an update from the City Council. She explained that the Council recently addressed a rental property that and took action to revoke their short-term rental license. She was happy to report that this home was now on the market. She explained the Council was beginning its discussions on the 2026 budget and noted at the upcoming worksession meeting the license plate reader cameras would be discussed. She indicated the first concert in the park would be held at Veterans Park on Thursday, June 12.

Director Paetznick reported the City received \$25,000 from the State to assist with the purchase of the ALPR cameras from Flock Safety. He indicated he was proposing the City purchase nine cameras. He stated he was excited to have the shared data for his officers that would be generated by this new system.

The Commission supported the City Council moving forward with the purchase of the ALPR cameras.

Director Paetznick explained the farmers market was held last Wednesday and the Public Safety Department was present. He noted Jeremy Berger was hired as the City's full time Fire Marshal. He reported that the SRO's had another successful year in the schools. He noted the department

was currently training three new officers and several others were finishing up their schooling. He encouraged residents to drive with care and caution this summer as there would be extra patrols on the roadways. He indicated Safety Camp would be held on Thursday, June 26. He stated National Night Out would be held on Tuesday, August 5. He stated Friday, August 1 would be the Public Safety Department's 25th Anniversary.

VII. Adjournment

Motion by Allen, seconded by Stout to adjourn the meeting at 7:51 p.m. Motion carried 6-0.

ORDINANCE INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

Chapter 342 of Minnesota Statutes, approved in 2023 & updated in 2024, allows for adult-use cannabis throughout the State of Minnesota. To ensure the city had ample time to prepare for this new industry, the City Council adopted a moratorium in 2023 prohibiting the establishment of adult-use cannabis businesses in New Brighton through 2024. This action ensured that the new laws could be studied, and proper regulations adopted before such businesses opened their doors locally. Following an extensive review of the State's new rules, the City Council approved Ordinance 911 (coincidental numbering) in November of 2024 to establish local regulations.

ORDINANCE HISTORY

- The Planning Commission reviewed the first draft of this ordinance on 8/20/24 and provided feedback and direction on needed updates.
- The ordinance was updated per PC direction and was then placed on the 9/4/24 EDC agenda (no discussion occurred due to lack of a quorum).
- The ordinance then went to the City Council for their first review of the language on 9/10/24. Council asked that the EDC be given another opportunity for review on 10/2/24.
- The Planning Commission reviewed a revised draft of the ordinance on 9/17/24 and recommended approval of the language in its present form subject to legal review.
- The EDC examined the ordinance on 10/2/24, and supported the approach giving guidance to Council to minimize buffers such that the City's primary commercial/mixed-use nodes were not excluded as potential locations for retail operations.
- The City Council then reviewed the language for a second time on 10/22/24 and directed staff on final changes to make prior to the language being ready for approval.
- Council approved the final ordinance on 11/12/24.

ORDINANCE 911 OVERVIEW

The following is a final rundown of the sections in Ordinance 911.

Ordinance Section 1: New City Code Chapter 35: Cannabis.

- **In General:** By entitling this chapter “cannabis,” staff’s intent was to coordinate nearly all cannabis-related City Code regulations into this single chapter of code. At the recommendation of legal counsel, public use regulations, once crafted via a separate ordinance, will be located elsewhere in the City Code (specific location TBD).

- **Line 11:** Establishes a new Chapter 35 in City Code.

- **Lines 12 – 21.** Names the new Chapter 35 Cannabis and outlines the seven Articles regulating cannabis therein.

- **Line 22. ARTICLE 1. ADMINISTRATION.** This article covers the purpose of the ordinance and applicable definitions.
 - **Lines 23 – 31. Findings and Purpose.** This language provides the City’s overarching set of reasons for adopting cannabis regulations and tells the reader what the City intends to accomplish within this new chapter.

 - **Lines 32 – 56. Definitions.** Establishes 12 new definitions specific to cannabis regulations.

- **Line 58: ARTICLE 2. CANNABIS AND HEMP BUSINESS REVIEW AND REGISTRATION.** This article covers when businesses are eligible for a local registration, how to apply for a local registration, compliance checks, yearly registration renewal, suspension rules, and limits on the total number of registrations.
 - **Lines 59 – 66. Cannabis Business Initial Zoning Certification.** Per the Office of Cannabis Management, the State’s review process will essentially follow these general steps:
 - 1) Business owner applies for state license;
 - 2) If all requirements are met for a state license, OCM will request the City complete a zoning review;
 - 3) If the zoning review is approved, the license will be issued subject to local registration requirements if the license is for a retail outlet
 - 4) Retail outlets would need to complete a local registration process with the City; non-retail outlets would be able to begin business.

Subsections (1) and (2) of Section 35-20 state that the City will need to complete a zoning review when requested by OCM, but that zoning approval does not guarantee future registration approval which must be completed under a separate/future review process.

- **Lines 67 – 72. Retailer Registration.** This language requires that a retailer obtain a state license prior to being registered by the City of New Brighton, and establishes penalties for sales without a valid local registration. Civil/administrative penalties are further discussed in Article 7 on lines 233 to 241.
- **Lines 73 – 75. Compliance Checks Prior to Retail Registration.** This section states that the city will review the proposed location for a business seeking registration of a new adult-use cannabis business. Review will include but not be limited to issues of zoning, building codes, parking, lighting, etc.
- **Lines 76 – 133. Local Registration Application and Review Procedure.** This section outlines how people will apply for local registration, how much it'll cost, how it'll be reviewed for potential approval, and the effect of approval (i.e. will be subject to compliance checks, cannot change locations, must renew the registration yearly, etc). Notable components include:
 - On fees, state law prohibits charging an “application” fee, but the city can charge for the requested “registration.”
 - A valid state license or written notice of a pre-approved license from OCM is required before registration review can begin.
 - As noted in State statute, we explicitly state that the local registration fee is non-refundable once processed as the City will be spending those funds in our review of the registration request.
 - Registrations must be approved if all requirements are met, and approved registrations cannot be transferred to a new owner or new location.
 - Annual compliance checks of locally registered businesses will be conducted by the City of New Brighton Public Safety department (much like is done for licensed alcohol businesses).
- **Lines 134 – 144. Renewal of Registration.** This section requires yearly renewal of the local registration to ensure all requirements are still being met, that all contact information is still up-to-date, that state licensure is still current, etc. By law, the city is required to renew local registration concurrent with yearly review of the state license.
- **Lines 145 – 179. Registration Enforcement.** This section outlines what happens when a registration holder violates local or state regulations, a registrant’s right to appeal and the applicable process, how the City will handle imminent threats to health & public safety, and how suspended registrations can be reinstated.

- **Lines 180 – 194. Retail Registration Limits.** Like the previous section, the intent of this section has not changed as the language still limits the overall number of registrations for retail stores in the community using a hard cap at the minimum number of retail stores required by state statute.
- **Line 196: ARTICLE 3. REQUIREMENTS FOR CANNABIS BUSINESSES.** This article establishes minimum buffer requirements for retail locations, zoning’s impact on locations, and allowed hours of operation for retail adult-use cannabis sales.
 - **Lines 197 – 203. Minimum Buffer Requirements.** Buffers around schools, day cares, and parks that include attractions that are regularly used by minors will include a 400’ buffer around their parcel’s perimeter within which retail sales cannot physically occur. As penned, a parcel or building bisected by the outer edge of the 400’ buffer would still be eligible for a retail location provided the retail sales would occur outside of the actual buffer area.
 - **Lines 204 – 208. Allowed Locations.** This section simply says that zoning must also be consulted to determine if a parcel is an eligible location for an adult-use cannabis retail business. Just because a parcel is outside of a restrictive buffer does not mean it’s an eligible location for a retail cannabis shop per the underlying zoning classification.
 - **Lines 209 – 212. Hours of Operation.** This section would limit daily operation to the most restrictive hours allowed by state statute.
- **Line 214: ARTICLE 4. TEMPORARY CANNABIS EVENTS.** The state will be issuing short-term “cannabis event organizer” licenses to allow cannabis sales events which are limited to four days. The regulations in this section outline how the city will treat these requests if/when they arise.
 - **Lines 216 – 219. Temporary Cannabis Event – License Required.** This section would send readers to Chapter 15 of City Code which contains all licensing provisions. Temporary Cannabis Events will be handled by a new Article 19 (in chapter 15) being created by Ordinance Section 2.
- **Lines 221 – 225: ARTICLE 5. LOWER-POTENCY HEMP EDIBLES AND DRINKS.** This Article indicates there are no special municipal rules governing lower-potency hemp edibles and drinks, and that such sales must follow all applicable rules, regulations, and restrictions outlined in State Statute as may be amended.
- **Lines 227 – 231: ARTICLE 6. LOCAL GOVERNMENT AS A CANNABIS RETAILER.** This Article states that the City of New Brighton is eligible to establish, own, and operate one municipal cannabis retail business subject to the provisions of Chapter 35. Any caps put on the overall number of retail registrations by Section 35-25 will not apply to the single municipal registration.

- **Lines 233 – 241: ARTICLE 7. PENALTY ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT.** This Article contains standard enforcement language stating violations constitute a misdemeanor, and that each day violations are maintained are considered separate offenses. An option to address violations under the City’s Administrative penalty procedures in City Code Chapter 18 was included.

Ordinance Section 2: Amendments to Chapter 15 of City Code, Licenses.

As part of the new State Law, the State of MN will be issuing “event organizer” permits to allow for temporary cannabis events. To prepare for this, the City must establish a licensing framework to ensure all requirements are being met locally by any such event.

- **Line 246: ARTICLE 19. TEMPORARY CANNABIS EVENTS.** This Article establishes that a license must be acquired before a temporary cannabis event can be held and outlines the application and review process that must occur.
 - **Lines 247 to 251. Purpose.** This section establishes that a license will be needed for temporary cannabis events to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community.
 - **Lines 252 to 255. Administrative License.** States that the public safety director or designee(s) will be responsible for reviewing and approving licensing for temporary cannabis events.
 - **Lines 256 to 277. Application.** Outlines all information the City will need to review a temporary cannabis event license request.
 - **Lines 278 to 304. Event Requirements.** This section outlines standards for temporary cannabis events as outlined in statute. The state will ostensibly be reviewing these matters before issuing a permit, but each should also be reviewed locally to ensure the City has a complete understanding of the event and how it’ll be run. General standards include:
 - **Security** is a requirement of state statute for temporary event organizers, so documenting that adequate security has been hired will be a priority with every license review.
 - **Controlled access** to the event will be critical to ensuring all other requirements are met. Our license review will require a site plan be submitted outlining how the grounds or building will be used, how access will be controlled, where all activities will occur (sales, use, waste control, product storage) etc.
 - Daily **clean up** will ensure products do not fall into the wrong hands, so conditions for clean up and disposal will be attached to any issued license.
 - **Transportation** of products to and from the event must be done by businesses licensed for cannabis transport.

- **Retail sales** must follow all statutory requirements.
 - **Insurance** may be required (same as the City requires for outdoor events currently).
 - **Noise** must meet City Code requirements.
 - **Food service**, if offered, must have all appropriate food licensing in place with the department of health.
 - Any **other needed permits or licenses** created by the proposed event (tent permit, electrical permit, etc) must also be obtained by the event organizer.
- **Lines 305 to 321. Temporary Structures; license fee; off-site signs.** This section mimics the standards used by the City for outdoor event permits.
 - **Lines 322 to 331. Cannabis event on-site consumption.** Per state statute, areas for on-site use of cannabis products can be designated at temporary events, so the draft language in Section 15-875 outlines what that would look like in our licensing review should use areas be allowed and should the proposed use area not conflict with the provisions of Section 35-80 (cannabis use in public places).

Ordinance Section 3: Amendments to the New Brighton Zoning Code.

This section identifies where various cannabis business types can locate within the City's various zoning districts.

- **Lines 336 to 357.** Adds definitions for the terms being used in code.
- **Lines 358 to 465.** Adds new uses to the appropriate zoning districts within code.

Ordinance Section 4: Fee Schedule Updates.

Establishes fees for registration based on statutory allowances. Over the course of the first year, staff will monitor the efforts which go into reviewing temporary cannabis events and will suggest an updated fee if deemed necessary. To begin with, our best estimate was \$500 given the outlined inspection and review process.

Ordinance Section 5: Effective Date.

Standard ordinance language used to conclude an ordinance.

23 **Sec. 35-1. Findings and Purpose**

24 The City of New Brighton makes the following legislative findings:

25 (1) The purpose of this ordinance is to implement the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, chapter 342,
26 which authorizes the City of New Brighton to protect the public health, safety, welfare of New
27 Brighton residents by regulating cannabis and hemp businesses within the City.

28 (2) The City of New Brighton finds and concludes that the proposed provisions are appropriate and
29 lawful regulations for the City of New Brighton, that the proposed amendments will promote the
30 community's interest in reasonable stability now and in the future, and that the proposed provisions
31 are in the public interest and for the public good.

32 **Sec. 35-5. Definitions**

33 Unless otherwise noted in this section, words and phrases contained in Minn. Stat. 342.01 and the rules
34 promulgated pursuant to any of these acts, shall have the same meanings in this ordinance.

35 (1) **Applicant** means an entity with a license issued by the OCM that is applying for an initial registration
36 or for registration renewal.

37 (2) **The Act** means Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 342, as is may be amended from time to time.

38 (3) **Cannabis Business** has the same meaning as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 342.01.

39 (4) **Cannabis Retailer** means a business with a cannabis retailer license or cannabis retail endorsement
40 from OCM.

41 (5) **Daycare.** A location licensed with the Minnesota Department of Human Services to provide the
42 care of a child in a residence outside the child's own home for gain or otherwise, on a regular basis,
43 for any part of a 24-hour day.

44 (6) **Retailer** means every business that is licensed under the Act and required to register with the City
45 under Minnesota Statutes, section 342.22. Including cannabis businesses and lower-potency hemp
46 edible retailers.

47 (7) **Office of Cannabis Management (OCM).** Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management, referred to
48 as "OCM" in this ordinance.

49 (8) **Potential Licensee** means an applicant that has not received a license from the OCM.

50 (9) **Residential Treatment Facility.** As defined under Minn. Stat. 245.462 subd. 23.

51 (10) **Retail Registration.** An approved registration issued by the City of New Brighton to a state-
52 licensed cannabis retail business or hemp business.

53 (11) **Temporary Cannabis Event.** A secured event, or a secured portion of a larger separately licensed
54 event, devoted to cannabis activities as permitted by state law and local regulations.

55 (12) **School.** A public school as defined under Minn. Stat. 120A.05 or a nonpublic school that must
56 meet the reporting requirements under Minn. Stat. 120A.24.

57 **Sections 35-6 through 35-19. Reserved.**

58

Article 2. Cannabis and Hemp Business Review and Registration

59 Sec. 35-20. Cannabis Business Initial Zoning Certification

60 (1) Pursuant to Minn. Stat. 342, within 30 days of receiving a copy of a state license application from
61 OCM, the City of New Brighton shall certify on a form provided by OCM whether a potential
62 licensee complies with local zoning ordinances and, if applicable, whether the proposed business
63 complies with the state fire code and building code.

64 (2) Successful approval of a site for zoning compliance does not guarantee that the potential licensee
65 will receive a retail registration. A complete application for retail registration must still be applied
66 for and obtained by a retailer before any retail sale to a customer.

67 Sec. 35-21. Retailer Registration

68 (1) Before making retail sales to customers or patients, a retailer must register with the City. Making
69 retail sales to customers without an active registration is prohibited.

70 (2) Subject to Minn. Stat. 342.22, subd. 5(e), the city may impose a civil penalty, as specified in the
71 City’s Fee Schedule, for making a sale to a customer or patient without a valid registration from
72 the City and a valid license from the OCM

73 Sec. 35-22. Compliance Checks Prior to Retail Registration

74 Prior to issuance of a cannabis retail business local registration, the City of New Brighton shall conduct a
75 preliminary compliance check of the building and site to ensure compliance with local ordinances.

76 Sec. 35-23. Local Registration Application and Review Procedure

77 (1) Fees

78 A. A registration fee, as established in the City of New Brighton’s fee schedule, shall be charged
79 to applicants depending on the type of retail business license applied for.

80 B. Initial registration fees and renewal registration fees are nonrefundable.

81 (2) Application Submittal

82 The City of New Brighton shall issue a local retail registration to a retailer that adheres to the
83 requirements of Minn. Stat. 342.22, and which qualifies for a registration under the provisions of
84 Chapter 35.

85 A. An applicant for initial registration or renewal shall fill out an application form as provided by
86 the City of New Brighton. Information required on the form shall include, but is not limited to:

- 87 1. Full name of the property owner and applicant;
- 88 2. Address, email address, and telephone number of the applicant;
- 89 3. The address and parcel ID for the property which the retail registration is sought;

- 90 4. Certification that the applicant complies with the requirements of local ordinances
91 established pursuant to Minn. Stat. 342.13.
- 92 5. Proof of taxes, assessments, utility charges or other financial claims of the city or the state
93 are current.
- 94 B. The applicant shall include with the form:
- 95 1. The required local registration fee as outlined in Section 35-22(1)
- 96 2. A copy of a valid state license or written notice of OCM license pre-approval;
- 97 3. A narrative describing the proposed business;
- 98 4. A site plan showing the building to house the business, available parking;
- 99 5. Floor plans for the proposed business which show compliance to all MN Building Code
100 requirements.
- 101 C. Once an application is considered complete, the City of New Brighton shall process the
102 required fee and forward the application to the Department of Community Assets &
103 Development for review.

104 **(3) Application Approval; Reasons for Denial; Transfers prohibited**

- 105 A. Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis based on the City receiving a
106 complete application and payment of all fees.
- 107 B. The date a certification under Section 35-20 is issued will have no impact on the applicant's
108 registration processing.
- 109 C. Complete applications shall be approved unless one of the following reasons for denial
110 applies:
- 111 1. The cannabis retail business would exceed the maximum number of registered cannabis
112 retail businesses permitted in the City under Section 2.6.
- 113 2. The applicant is unable to meet the requirements of City Code Chapter 35 or applicable
114 zoning regulations for the proposed business location.
- 115 D. A registration shall not be transferrable to a new owner.

116 **(4) Annual Compliance Checks**

- 117 A. The City of New Brighton shall complete, at a minimum, one compliance check per calendar
118 year of every cannabis business to assess if the business meets age verification requirements
119 as required under Minn. Stat. 342.22 Subd. 4(b), Minn. Stat. 342.24, and Chapter 35 of this
120 Municipal code.
- 121 B. The City of New Brighton shall conduct, at a minimum, one unannounced age verification
122 compliance check at least once per calendar year.
- 123 C. Age verification compliance checks shall involve persons at least 17 years of age but under the
124 age of 21 who, with the prior written consent of a parent or guardian if the person is under
125 the age of 18, attempt to purchase adult-use cannabis flower, adult-use cannabis products,
126 lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products under the direct
127 supervision of a law enforcement officer or an employee of the local unit of government.

128 D. Any failures under this section are a basis for enforcement action and shall be reported to the
129 Office of Cannabis Management.

130 (5) **Location Change**

131 A state-licensed cannabis retail business shall be required to submit a new application for local
132 registration following the provisions of Section 35-23(2) if it seeks to move to a new location
133 within the legal boundaries of the City of New Brighton.

134 **Sec. 35-24. Renewal of Registration**

135 (1) Each year, a state-licensed cannabis retail business shall apply to renew local registration on a
136 form established by the City of New Brighton.

137 A. *Renewal Fees.*

138 A renewal fee for local registration shall be required starting at the second renewal, as
139 established in the City of New Brighton's fee schedule.

140 B. *Renewal Application.*

141 The application for renewal of a local retail registration shall include, but are not limited to, all
142 items required under Section 35-22(2) of this Ordinance.

143 (2) The City of New Brighton shall renew the local registration of a state-licensed cannabis retail
144 business concurrent with and subject to OCM renewal of the State license for the business.

145 **Sec. 35-25. Registration Enforcement.**

146 (1) **Generally.** The City Council may impose a fine or suspend a registration under this Chapter upon
147 finding that the registered business has failed to comply with the requirements of this Chapter or
148 any applicable statute or regulation.

149 (2) **Notice and Right to Hearing.** Upon determining a violation has occurred, the City shall provide the
150 registered business with written notice of the alleged violation(s) and inform the business of their
151 right to appeal.

152 A. The notice shall be delivered in person or by regular mail to the address of the registered
153 business. The notice shall outline the identified violation(s) and indicate that an appeal must
154 be submitted within ten (10) business days of service of the notice, or the business' right to a
155 hearing will be waived.

156 1. If the registered business submits a written application for appeal within the required
157 timeframe, the registered business will be given an opportunity for a hearing before the
158 City Manager or the City Manager's designee. The City Manager or the City Manager's
159 designee shall listen to the positions of the registered business giving due regard to the
160 frequency and seriousness of the violations, the ease with which such violations could
161 have been cured or avoided, and any good faith efforts to comply. Following
162 consideration of all facts, the City Manager or the City Manager's designee shall issue a
163 final decision, in writing and if warranted, to impose a fine or suspend the registration.
164 The written decision shall contain the findings of fact used to support the decision.

165 2. Within 10 business days of the City Manager or designee issuing their final decision, the
166 decision may be appealed by the registered business to the City Council.

167 B. If no request for a hearing is received within ten (10) business days following service of the
168 original notice, or once the hearing and appeal process before the City Manager has
169 concluded, the matter shall be submitted to the City Council for imposition of the fine or
170 suspension of the registration.

171 (3) **Emergency.** If, in the discretion of the City, a registered business poses an imminent threat to the
172 health or safety of the public, the City may immediately suspend the registration. The notice of
173 immediate suspension must include the alleged violation and reason for immediate suspension
174 and provide notice of the business's right to appeal and be heard as prescribed in part (2) of this
175 section. An emergency suspension shall remain in effect throughout an appeal process until
176 resolved by either the City Manager or the City Manager's designee, or by the City Council.

177 (4) **Reinstatement.** The City may reinstate a registration if it determines that the violations have been
178 resolved. The City shall reinstate a registration if the OCM determines the violations have been
179 resolved.

180 **Sec. 35-26. Retail Registration Limits**

181 (1) The City will issue one registration per 12,500 residents in the City.

182 (2) The number of registrations available will be calculated by dividing the state demographer's
183 estimate of the City's population by 12,500 and rounding up to the nearest whole number.

184 (3) The City will update the number of registrations available based on the most recent data available
185 from the state's demographer on January 2nd of each calendar year.

186 (4) If the number of registrations available within the City decreases based on the County reaching
187 the one per 12,500 threshold or the City's population decreases below a previous threshold,
188 businesses with current registrations will be allowed to maintain and renew their registrations but
189 no new registration will be issued.

190 (5) Registrations issued to businesses with a license preapproval will count toward the City's
191 registration limit.

192 (6) Businesses operating under a tribal compact entered into under Minnesota Statutes, section
193 3.9224 or 3.9228 and tribally issued licenses and registrations are/are not counted towards the
194 City's registration limit and the County registration limit.

195 **Sec. 35-27 through 35-39. Reserved.**

196

Article 3. Requirements for Cannabis Businesses

197 **Sec. 35-40. Minimum Buffer Requirements**

198 (1) The City of New Brighton prohibits local registration of a new cannabis business where retail sales
199 would physically occur within 400 feet of the property line of any schools, day cares, or parks that
200 include attractions that are regularly used by minors.

201 (2) Nothing in Section 35-40 shall prohibit an active, previously registered, cannabis business from
202 continuing operation at the same site if a school with a minimum buffer standard chooses to
203 move too close to an existing registered cannabis business.

204 **Sec. 35-41. Allowed locations**

205 The City’s zoning code identifies where the variety of cannabis businesses defined by the state of
206 Minnesota can locate within the city. Land which is outside of the minimum buffer requirements
207 established in Section 35-40 may still be ineligible for all or some cannabis businesses depending on
208 assigned zoning designations.

209 **Sec. 35-42. Hours of Operation**

210 Cannabis businesses are limited to retail sale of cannabis, cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower-
211 potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 9:00
212 p.m., seven days a week.

213 **Sec. 35-43 through 35-59. Reserved.**

214 **Article 4. Temporary Cannabis Events**

215 **Sec. 35-60. License Required for Temporary Cannabis Events**

216 (1) **Temporary Cannabis Event – License Required**

217 A. A license is required to be issued and approved by the City of New Brighton prior to holding a
218 Temporary Cannabis Event. License review and issuance shall follow the procedures for
219 Temporary Cannabis Event Licenses in Chapter 15, Article 19 of City Code.

220 **Sec. 35-61 through 35-64. Reserved.**

221 **Article 5. Lower-Potency Hemp Edibles and Drinks**

222 **Sec. 35-65. State Statutes Apply**

223 Cannabis businesses that only sell lower-potency hemp edibles and drinks, as defined by State Statute,
224 shall only be subject to the rules, regulations, and restrictions outlined in State Statute as may be
225 amended.

226 **Sec. 35-66 through 35-69. Reserved.**

227 **Article 6. Local Government as a Cannabis Retailer**

228 **Sec. 35-70. Municipal Cannabis Retail Location Permitted**

229 The City of New Brighton may establish, own, and operate one municipal cannabis retail business subject
230 to the restrictions in Chapter 35. This single municipal cannabis retail location shall not be subject to
231 retail registration limits outlined in Section 35-25.

232 **Sec. 35-71 through 35-79. Reserved**

233 **Article 7. Penalty Administration and Enforcement**

234 **Sec. 35-80 Penalties Administration and Enforcement**

235 Any violation of the provisions of this Chapter or failure to comply with any of its requirements
236 constitutes a misdemeanor and is punishable as defined by law. Each day each violation continues or
237 exists, constitutes a separate offense. Violations of this ordinance can occur regardless of whether or
238 not a permit is required for a regulated activity listed in this ordinance. Violations of this Chapter may
239 also be addressed under City Code, Chapter 18, Article 5– Administrative Penalties.

240 Violation of this Chapter shall be grounds for enforcement against any business license issued by the
241 City of New Brighton.

242 **Sec. 35-81 through 35-99. Reserved**

243 **ORDINANCE SECTION 2. Amendments to Chapter 15 of City Code.**

244 Chapter 15 of City Code is restated and incorporated herein unchanged, and a NEW Article 19.
245 Temporary Cannabis Events, is added as follows:

246 **Article 19. Temporary Cannabis Events**

247 **Section 15-850. Purpose.**

248 The purpose of this Article is to regulate temporary cannabis events permitted by the State of
249 Minnesota. These regulations are intended to ensure that temporary cannabis events in New Brighton
250 protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community, and that events are following both local and
251 state regulations throughout their duration.

252 **Section 15-855. Administrative License.**

253 No person shall use his or her property or assist, countenance or allow the use of his or her property, or
254 of another's property, located within the City of New Brighton for any form of temporary cannabis event
255 without first having obtained a license from the public safety director or designee(s).

256 **Section 15-860. Application.**

257 An application for a license must be filed with the city. Said application shall include the following
258 information:

- 259 (1) A narrative description of the event including the name of the event and proposed location;
- 260 (2) A list of all activities to take place at the event;
- 261 (3) The name of the sponsoring entity and/or main contact person, along with their address, email
262 address, and phone number;
- 263 (4) The proposed date and time of the event together with the beginning and ending times for each
264 date;
- 265 (5) A list of the name, number, and type of cannabis businesses and hemp businesses that will sell
266 cannabis plants, adult-use cannabis flower, adult-use cannabis products, lower-potency hemp
267 edibles, and hemp-derived consumer products at the event.
- 268 (6) A diagram of the physical layout of the temporary cannabis event showing where the event will
269 take place on the grounds, all entrances and exits that will be used by participants during the
270 event, all cannabis consumption areas, all cannabis retail areas where cannabis flower, cannabis
271 products, lower-potency hemp edibles, and hemp-derived consumer products will be sold, the
272 location where cannabis waste will be stored, and any location where cannabis flower, cannabis
273 products, lower-potency hemp edibles, and hemp-derived consumer products will be stored;
- 274 (7) Location of any barricades, street route plans, or perimeter/security fencing;
- 275 (8) The estimated number of event staff, participants, and sponsors;
- 276 (9) Any other information deemed necessary to ensure the safety, health, and welfare of the people
277 and lands surrounding the proposed temporary cannabis event.

278 **Section 15-865. Event Requirements.**

279 In order to be approved, an applicant must demonstrate the following items will be successfully handled
280 over the course of the temporary cannabis event:

- 281 (1) **Security.** The cannabis event organizer must hire or contract for licensed security personnel to
282 provide security services at the cannabis event in compliance with the provisions of MN Statute
283 342.40(3) as may be amended.

- 284 (2) **Limited and Controlled Access.** The cannabis event organizer shall ensure that access to the
 285 event is limited to individuals who are at least 21 years of age and maintain compliance with MN
 286 Statute 342.40(4) as may be amended.
- 287 (3) **Clean Up.** The cannabis event organizer shall ensure that all used, unused, and waste cannabis
 288 plants, adult-use cannabis flower, adult-use cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, and
 289 hemp-derived consumer products that are not removed by a customer, cannabis business, or
 290 hemp business are disposed of in a manner approved by OCM each day of the event.
- 291 (4) **Transportation.** The cannabis event organizer shall ensure that the transportation of cannabis
 292 plants, adult-use cannabis flower, adult-use cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, and
 293 hemp-derived consumer products intended for display or sale and all such items used for display
 294 or not sold during the cannabis event are transported to and from the cannabis event by a
 295 licensed cannabis transporter.
- 296 (5) **Retail.** Retail areas of the temporary cannabis event shall be in compliance with the provisions of
 297 MN Statute 342.40(7) as may be amended.
- 298 (6) **Insurance.** Certificates of insurance may be required to ensure the public safety and welfare.
- 299 (7) **Noise.** Any noise generated by the event shall be regulated in accordance with city code section
 300 14-235(g).
- 301 (8) **Food.** In the event food will be served at the temporary cannabis event, an appropriate food
 302 license must be obtained through the county department of public health.
- 303 (9) **Other permits.** Any other applicable permit such as an electrical permit or a tent permit, must
 304 also be obtained by the cannabis event organizer prior to the event occurring.

305 **Section 15-870. Temporary structures; license fee; off-site signs.**

- 306 (1) Tents, stands, and other temporary structures for the event may be allowed for the duration of
 307 the event as part of an issued license.
- 308 (2) The license fee for temporary cannabis events shall be as established in the city's yearly fee
 309 schedule.
- 310 (3) Off-site signs promoting or announcing the temporary cannabis event may be authorized through
 311 the license, subject to the following conditions:
- 312 A. Such signs may only be erected one week prior to the event and must be removed within one
 313 day after the event;
- 314 B. Such signs may only be placed on private property with permission of the underlying property
 315 owner;
- 316 C. Off-site signs are limited to a total of five locations;
- 317 D. Only one sign may be permitted per location;
- 318 E. Such signs are limited to six square feet in area and four square feet in height;

319 F. Signs allowed without a permit per section 9-040(3)(G) of the zoning code do not need to be
320 included in the license required under this article.

321 G. This subsection does not apply to signs permitted under zoning code section 9-046.

322 **Section 15-875. Cannabis event on-site consumption.**

323 (1) A temporary cannabis event may designate an area for consumption of adult-use cannabis flower,
324 adult-use cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, hemp-derived consumer products, or
325 any combination of those items, provided the location meets the requirements of Chapter 35,
326 Article 7.

327 (2) The cannabis event organizer shall ensure that consumption of adult-use cannabis flower, adult-
328 use cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products within a
329 designated consumption area is not visible from any public place.

330 (3) The cannabis event organizer shall not permit consumption of alcohol or tobacco anywhere within
331 the temporary cannabis event when the event includes an on-site consumption area.

332 **ORDINANCE SECTION 3. Amendments to the New Brighton Zoning Code**

333 Chapter 2 of the New Brighton Zoning Code, Article 1, Section 2-020, is hereby amended to add
334 the following definitions in alphabetical order with existing definitions (numbering to be
335 updated accordingly):

336 ***Cannabis cultivation business** means a business with a cannabis cultivator license, medical cannabis*
337 *cultivator license, or cultivation endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis*
338 *Management.*

339 ***Cannabis delivery business** means a business with a cannabis delivery service license or delivery*
340 *service endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.*

341 ***Cannabis event organizer** means a business with a cannabis event organizer license or event*
342 *organization endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.*

343 ***Cannabis manufacturing business** means a business with a cannabis manufacturer license, or*
344 *manufacturing endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.*

345 ***Cannabis retailer** means a business with a cannabis retailer license, medical cannabis retailer*
346 *license, lower-potency hemp edible retailer license, or retail endorsement from the State of*
347 *Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.*

348 ***Cannabis testing business** means a business with a cannabis testing facility license or testing*
349 *endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.*

350 ***Cannabis transportation business** means a business with a cannabis transporter license or*
351 *transportation endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.*

352 ***Cannabis wholesaling business*** means a business with a cannabis wholesaler license or wholesaling
353 endorsement from the State of Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management.

354 ***Lower-potency hemp edible retailer*** means a business with a lower-potency hemp edible retailer
355 license from the Office of Cannabis Management.

356 ***Lower-potency hemp edible manufacturer*** means a business with a lower-potency hemp edible
357 manufacturer license from the Office of Cannabis Management.

358 Chapter 5 of the New Brighton Zoning Code, Article 3, is hereby amended as follows:

359 Section 5-210 is restated and incorporated herein unchanged

360 **Section 5-220. Permitted Uses in a B-3 District**

- 361 (1) All uses permitted in B-1 and B-2 Business Districts.
- 362 (2) The sale of food and beverages of all kinds including the sale for consumption on the
363 premises.
- 364 (3) The sale of general merchandise including sale in department stores.
- 365 (4) The sale of apparel of all kinds.
- 366 (5) The sale of furniture and household goods including furniture and accessory furniture storage.
- 367 (6) The sale of other goods and merchandise.
- 368 (7) [Lower-potency hemp edible retailers](#)
- 369 (8) [Cannabis retailer](#)
- 370 (9) Eating places of all types.
- 371 (10) Service establishments permitted in a neighborhood business district without limitation on the
372 number of persons engaged in such work or business and cat and dog hospitals or pet shops
373 provided that noise and odors are effectively confined to the premises.
- 374 (11) Business offices and services in addition to the uses permitted in neighborhood business
375 districts; and office buildings and banks.
- 376 (12) Parking lots when such lots are accessory to a principal use on an adjacent lot.
- 377 (13) The City Council shall consider other uses not listed in this Section. Such uses may be
378 permitted at the discretion of the City Council pursuant to and in accordance with Sections 8-
379 700 through 8-720 of the Zoning Code.

380 **Sec. 5-230. Permitted Accessory Uses in a B-3 District.**

- 381 (1) All accessory uses permitted in B-1 and B-2 Districts.
- 382 (2) Signs as regulated in Chapter 9 of the Zoning Code.
- 383 (3) Up to four electronic amusement devices or games are permitted accessory uses except that
384 up to ten electronic amusement devices or games shall be a permitted accessory use to a B-3
385 District permitted principal use if the floor area of said principal use is at least 25,000 square
386 feet. In the case of shopping centers, only that leased space for a given principal use and no
387 other part of the shopping center may be considered in determining whether the principal use
388 contains at least 25,000 square feet. (Code of 1988; Ord. No. 499, 9-15-82; Code of 2001)
- 389 (4) [Cannabis Delivery service accessory to an authorized State licensed cannabis retailer.](#)

399 (6) The manufacturing, assembling, and/or processing of the following:
400 A. Beverages and bottling.
401 B. Business machines, such as typewriters, accounting machines, calculators, computers,
402 and card counting equipment.
403 C. Cameras and other photographic equipment except film.
404 D. [Cannabis products and products derived from the hemp plant.](#)
405 E. Canvas and canvas products.

407 G. Cosmetics and toiletries.
408 H. Electric appliances such as lighting fixtures, irons, fans, toasters and electric toys.

414 frying, grinding, mixing and pressing, except the rendering of fats and oils.
415 L. Glass products from previously manufactured glass.
416 M. Hair, felt, and feather products except washing, curing and dyeing.
417 N. Hat bodies of fur and wool felt.
418 O. Ink mixing and packaging and inked ribbons.
419 P. Leather products including shoes and matching belting.
420 Q. Luggage.
421 R. Metal: finishing, plating, grinding, sharpening, polishing, cleaning, rust-proofing, and
422 heat treatment.
423 S. Metal: stamping and extrusion of small products such as costume jewelry, pins and
424 needles, razor blades, bottle caps, buttons, and kitchen utensils.
425 T. Musical instruments.
426 U. Orthopedic and medical appliances such as artificial limbs.
427 V. Paper products such as envelopes and stationary, bags, boxes, tubes, and wallpaper
428 printing.
429 W. Plastic products such as tableware, phonograph records, and buttons.
430 X. Printing.
431 Y. Rubber products, small and synthetic treated fabrics such as washers, gloves, footwear,
432 bathing caps, and atomizers except for all rubber and synthetic processing

- 433 Z. Silverware, plate, and sterling.
- 434 AA. Soap and detergents: packaging only.
- 435 BB. Sporting and athletic equipment such as balls, baskets, cues, gloves, bats, racquets, and
- 436 rods.
- 437 CC. Statuary, mannequins, figurines, religious and church art goods excluding foundry
- 438 operations.
- 439 DD. Textiles: spinning, weaving, manufacturing, dyeing.
- 440 EE. Tools and hardware such as bolts, nuts and screws, doorknobs, drills, hand tools,
- 441 cutlery, hinges, house hardware, locks, nonferrous castings, and plumbing appliances.

- 443 GG. Bulk upholstery including mattress manufacturing, rebuilding, and renovating.

- 446 JJ. Vaults, caskets, and burial vaults.
- 447 KK. Welded screen manufacturing, conducted entirely within a fully enclosed, climate

- 449 (7) Adult establishments licensed under Chapter 15, Article 14 of the City Code.

450 **Sec. 6-040. Permitted Accessory Uses in an I-I District.**

- 451 (1) Restaurants, lunch counters, and confectioneries to serve employees of the District.
- 452 (2) One dwelling for security personnel.
- 453 (3) Off-street parking and off-street loading as regulated under the Zoning Code.
- 454 (4) [Cannabis Delivery service accessory to an authorized State licensed cannabis retailer.](#)
- 455 (5) Other uses which are definitely necessary for the successful operation of the permitted uses
- 456 of this District with the exception of outside storage which shall be allowed by special use
- 457 permit under the provisions of Section 6-050.
- 458 (6) Signs as regulated in Chapter 9.

459 Sections 6-050 through 6-060 are restated and incorporated herein unchanged



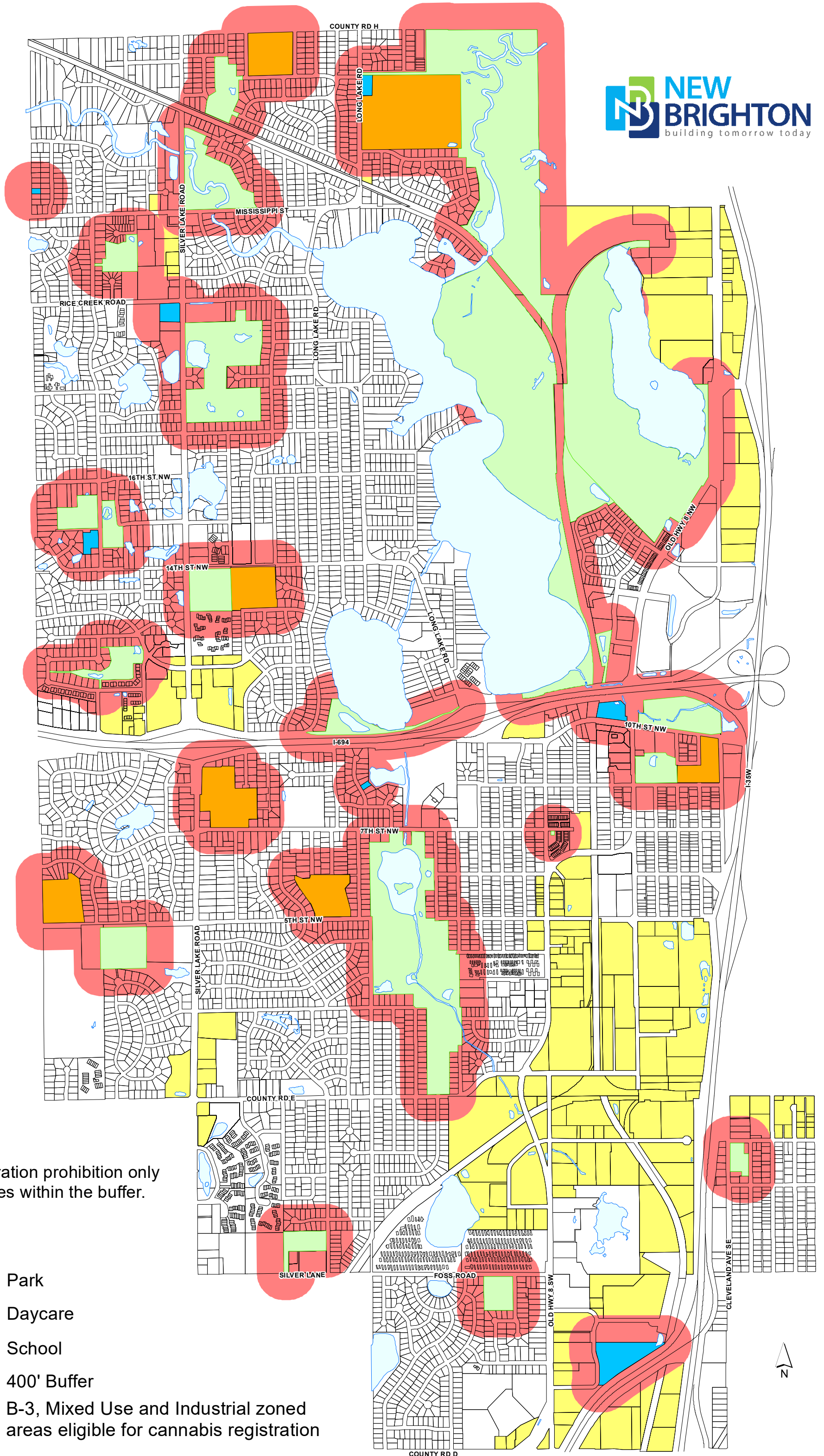
